The Internal Affairs Section received a total of 238 complaints or allegations during 2014. There were a total of 215 Internal Investigations and 23 Citizen complaints.

A total of 24 use of force incidents were reported during 2014. Nine incidents were reported for the Law Enforcement Bureau (to include 2 incidents of deadly use of force), and 15 incidents were reported for the Detention Bureau.





Commendations and Awards

The Sheriff's Office provides recognition to those employees and citizens whose actions exemplify our core values, specifically: Courage, Integrity, Respect, Perseverance and Initiative. At the Annual Sheriff's Office Awards Ceremony, the Sheriff recognized 28 employees, the Communications Section and the El Paso County Sherriff's Association with a Certificate of Appreciation for 2014.

Thirteen (13) Lifesaving Medals, (18) Commendation, (11) Sheriff's Citation (4) Unit Citations and (4) Executives of the Year Awards were among the Awards presented by Sheriff Wiles.

Region VIII Training Academy

The Region VIII Training Academy focuses on hiring the best personnel to work in a dynamic and challenging environment. For individuals wishing to become employees and make a difference in their community, they must pass a comprehensive background check, specific physical, academic, and psychological requirements. Making sure new recruits meet all training standards is one of the many roles of the Region VIII Training Academy.

The Academy is comprised of seven staff members who support the daily operations of the Sheriff's office such as Pre-Employment Physical Assessments, In-Service Training and maintaining Training Records.


In-service instruction, online training and continued FSD training produced the bulk of instruction with 75,969 student contact hours, 605 resident courses and 108 online courses. The Training Academy conducted four basic detention officer and one basic peace officers academy in 2014.

The El Paso County Sheriff's Office Patrol Division is responsible for patrolling a total of 1,015 square miles in the westernmost county in the state of Texas. According to the 2013 census, there are approximately 827,718 residents in El Paso County. Based on service demands and call volume, the Patrol Division has patrol stations and districts in strategic areas that provide consistent and efficient response to criminal activity. The Patrol Division strives to identify areas where processes can be streamlined and improved, while simultaneously allowing the Sheriff's Office to be more effective, proactive and responsive to community needs. The Patrol Division is divided into two operational areas which consist of Patrol and Special Operations. The Patrol function is delegated to three operational areas within the County: Montana Station, Clint Station, and Northwest Station. Each station is supervised by a lieutenant and has a designated number of districts to patrol. The Special Operations Section consists of Traffic Section, School Resource Officers (SRO), Environmental Crime, Animal Control, Targeted Response Unit (TRU) and Specialty Teams. In 2014, the Patrol Division responded to 109,177 calls for service, a total of 22,251 traffic citations were issued, and made 787 felony arrests.



The Be Pago County Sheriff's Office Headquarters is located on the east side of the County, within El Paso City Limits. The Headquarters Office for the Patrol Division houses the Division Commander, and the Special Operations Lieutenant. In addition, it is the

hub of communications between the issuance and deployment of patrol resources to address specific crime issues or trends.

The Special Operations Section consists of four(4) sections, each overseen by a Sergeant: Traffic, Target Response Unit (TRU), School Resource Officer (SRO) Section. The SRO Sergeant in charge also oversees the Environmental Section and Animal Control. Specialty Teams consist of SWAT, CNT and SAR.

The North West Patrol Station is located in far north El Paso County, in the Town of Vinton, with direct access to major roadways allowing for timely responses to calls for service in the Upper Valley. It is managed by a Station Commander who holds the rank of Lieutenant. The Station Commander has primary responsibility for three patrol districts identified within its geographical area. The area of responsibility for the Vinton Patrol Station encompasses an area west of the western city limits of El Paso, North to the New Mexico state line, and from the edge of the Franklin Mountains State Park West to the New Mexico state line. This includes West Way, Canutillo, Town of Vinton and Tranmountain Road.

The Montana Patrol Station is located in the far east northern area of El Paso County. It has direct access to major roadways that allow for a timely response to calls for service. It is managed by a Station Commander who holds the rank of Lieutenant. The Station Commander has primary responsibility for four patrol districts as well as the field Training Officer program. These districts encompass from the eastern city limits of the City of El Paso to the Hudspeth County line, and north to the Federal Military Reservation and south to Interstate Highway 10. Their area of responsibility includes Montana Vista, Hueco Tank Estates, North Ascension areas, West Texas Airport, Emerald Park Estates and other outlying

around Horizon City.

The Clint Patrol Station is located in the southeast Lower Valley of El Paso County, centrally located within the Town of Clint. It has easy access to major roadways allowing for timely response to calls for service. The Station is commanded by a Lieutenant who has primary responsibility for four patrol dis-

tricts, These districts encompass an area east of the El Paso City limits to the Hudspeth county line and north of the international border. The specific areas of responsibility for the Clint Patrol Station are El Paso Hills, Lynwood Estates, Agua Dulce Subdivision, Las Colonias Subdivision, Town of Clint, San Elizario, Fabens, Tornillo, and Palo Alto.





CRIMINAL INVESTIGATIONS



The men and women of the El Paso County Sheriff's Office Criminal Investigations Division are responsible for investigations, examination and analysis of crime scenes, evidence collection, and working in conjunction with the District Attorney's Office for successful prosecutions.

The Division is comprised of 130 personnel (82 Law enforcement officers and 48 civilians) divided into eight sections, all focused on providing the highest quality investigative services to the public and the criminal justice system.

Crimes Against Persons and Crimes Against Property are two investigative sections in this division, dedicated to investigating reported Crimes. The other three sections consist of Civil Processing, Crime Records, Evidence and Forensics, and Criminal Warrants and Apprehension. In 2014 the Criminal Investigations Division went through a major realignment. The Special Operations Division and its two sections, Border Crime Initiative (BCI) and High—Intensity Drug Trafficking Area (HIDTA) were assigned to this—Division.

This report provides numerous statistical crime data collected, measuring the division's investigative productivity. The crime data collected for specific crimes direct us to proactive measures by pre-planning tactical investigative operations, aggressive investigating and collaboration with the Patrol Division and/or the Special Operations Division in taking measures to prevent crimes and identify suspects who may be involved in criminal activity.

Detention Services

The El Paso County Detention Services Bureau, under the command of Executive Chief Deputy Sylvia Aguilar, consists of two adult maximum-security detention facilities; the Detention Facility Division and the Jail Annex Division. The operational concept for both facilities is to receive unclassified persons, house pre-trial and convicted persons, and allow for processing, classifying and releasing of persons 24 hours a day. Both facilities house federal and state inmates.





Detention Services

Located at 12501 E. Montana, the Jail Annex is of modular design, comprised of three units, each consisting of four pods. It has a capacity of 1440 Inmates and has an infirmary capable of holding 14 inmates. The Jail Annex receives classified persons from the Detention Facility and holds pretrial and convicted persons.

The Jail Annex, supervised by Commander Robert Flores, houses male inmates only. For year 2014, The Jail Annex Division was funded \$32,537,235 for operations.

In 2014, there were 3,458 persons booked into the jail Annex compared to 626 in 2013, an increase of 2,832 intakes. The increase was due to the reopening of the booking section. These bookings ranged from misdemeanors to felony arrests. For 2014 the Jail Annex Division averaged approximately 1,326 inmates daily, compared to 1388 in 2013.




The Detention Facility, supervised by Commander Marco Vargas, is located at 601 E. Overland across the street from federal courts, state district and county courts, a Justice of the Peace court, and city municipal courts. The facility has over 310,440 square feet and a housing capacity of 1034 inmates. The facility has nine housing floors, two of which are


designated for females. For 2014, the Detention facility was funded \$35,680,036.00 for operations.

In 2014, the Inmate Processing Unit (IPU) processed 31,021 persons into the Detention Facility compared to 30,347 in 2013, a increase of 674. Bookings ranged from misdemeanors to felony arrests; both federal and state.

El Paso County Sheriff's Jurisdiction



El Paso County covers almost 1,015 square miles and has a population of more than 827,000. The primary focus for the El Paso County Sheriff's Office is in the unincorporated areas of the county.

While incorporated cities within the county have their own law enforcement agencies, the El Paso County Sheriff's Office serves the entire county.

Economic development continues to affect these parts of the county with El Paso County being one of the fastest growing counties in the United States.

Strategically located stations in the northwest and eastern part of the county provide greater presence of law enforcement across the county, especially in unincorporated areas.
